

Father Paul's Corner

The miracle of Water and the God Connection

Anytime someone questions me about the existence of God, I always fall back upon my science background. There are just too many instances where our

existence and the creation of the universe could have happened without intelligent design. There are unlimited examples of God's intelligent design but one great example of this is the miracle of water.

Water is considered a molecule. A **molecule** is a group of two or more atoms that are held together by attractive forces known as covalent bonds. The water molecule looks like an upside-down mickey mouse. Notice how the oxygen atom has a negative charge and the hydrogen atoms in a pair, both have positive charges. If the charges were the same, they would repel each other, thus the water molecule would not have that covalent bond. There is also a 104.45-degree separation angle that is essential for the covalent bond to work this is referred to as a dipole. Water has a special surface tension and density that this covalent bond makes possible. Animal cells are made up of 70 percent water where plant cells are made up between 80 to 90 percent water.

Water can exist in all three states of matter: solid (ice), liquid (water), and gas (water vapor), meaning that depending on the temperature, water can be a solid, a liquid, or a gas; with the liquid state


being the most common at room temperature. The three states of matter come into play when dealing with weather on our planet but explaining more about this can wait for another discussion. Without water, planet earth would indeed just be another barren third rock from the sun. Let us celebrate God's creation by acknowledging


that none of this could happen by accident and that our loving God created us with pure perfection. *Amen.*




A Request from the church Secretary:




History of St. Patrick's Day Celebration

The historical **Patrick was captured as a youth in Roman Britain, sometime in the fifth century AD.** He was transported to Ireland, where he spent six years as a slave. He eventually escaped and made his way back home. He became an ecclesiastic and many years later left Britain and returned to

Ireland as a missionary. During the first millennium, there was

no formal canonization process in the Catholic Church. **After becoming a priest and helping to spread Christianity throughout Ireland**, Patrick was likely proclaimed a saint by popular acclaim. He died at Saul, Downpatrick, Ireland, March 17, 461.



Green was finally introduced to St. Patrick's Day festivities in the 18th century, when the shamrock (which



is, of course, green) became a national symbol. **Because of the shamrock's popularity and Ireland's landscape**, the color stuck to the holiday.

<u>Alaina Niemann and an Exciting Trip to Iceland</u>

"Why Iceland in January?", you may be asking. Considering the weather is the same as in Wyoming but with lots less tourist traffic, we figured we were made for such a trip. And it was amazing! My main



mission was to see the Northern Lights & we accomplished that mission just outside Akuryeri, a city in the north, at about 6:00 pm on Jan.1. It's amazing that the lights look like barely colored wisps of clouds with the naked eye, but burst with colors through the camera lens. We rented a car & drove over 1000 miles around the western, northern, &

southern parts of the island.

We rode the Icelandic pony, experienced the trot gait, & I fell head over heels for this pony. We did not see a single cow anywhere but herds of these horses were always outside no matter how cold it got (temps ranged from 5-16 degrees, raising

up to 34 on the day we left). The sheep & cows get to stay in the barn.



As for adventure, we did some snowmobiling on a glacier, hiked a glacier with some seriously sharp spikes, explored many ice caves, & snorkeled the continental fissure between Europe & North America. I was truly amazed that our guides did this once & then decided they wanted to do it every day. It required many layers of dry clothes under a heavy duty "dry" suit of rubber completely sealed everywhere except around your eyes. I'm not sure the rubber gloves were of any use at all considering my hands were blocks of ice the second I put them on, but I did what I was told. When the moment came for me to step into the 35 degree crystal clear glacier water, I started to question the wisdom of my decision to do this, but took the plunge. Numb lips were surprisingly not an issue. Blocks of ice for fingers did bother me, but by that point in our trip, I guess I was used to it. So, I survived & now have



the bragging rights, but once is enough! Everything about Iceland is top notch, first world. We never had an issue with cell service. However, *EVERY-THING* is very expensive. Considering they don't grow much of anything (a few potatoes & whatever veggies

they can squeeze into greenhouses), they import everything except their local meat & & eat meat from just about anything that moves on land or in

the sea; reindeer, lamb, veal, fish, whale, sea bird, Puffin, & <u>horse</u>. They take great pride in their pure-bred ponies, and I was told they are Iceland's top export, but the ugly horses end up on the menu. I couldn't do it, but my husband indulged, so feel free to give him an evil glare if you see him, lol.

Scenery was amazing. Lots of impressive waterfalls. And no one parties like Icelanders on New Years Eve. Everyone seems to have an arsenal of





fireworks they are allowed to shoot off anywhere. No one gets to sleep before midnight unless you can sleep through a war zone. Imagine fireworks all going off simultaneously! Fire danger is rather low there, except for exploding volcanoes, which we were fortunate to miss. Even the ships in the port were shooting off their flares, apparently a good use before the flare expires.

The land is black, covered by lava rock. We did see hot lava in a lava show where they melt lava rock into magma (in a furnace made in Michigan!) & then sort of play with it. Amazing how hot that room got.

<u>Parting thoughts:</u> the traditional fermented shark bites were absolutely disgusting & almost made me vomit. You are supposed to drink a shot of Brinnivin after tasting it, which was equally disgusting. After all that, I decided I was no longer hungry, which was just fine. The high humidity did terrible things to my hair so I dressed like the natives & wore a ski hat. No one seems to need more than 4 oz of coffee, and at \$4, I tried to be satisfied as well. It was nice to come back to the land of 16oz. Wyoming coffee!


