attend and help in the removal.





Spirit of the Winds **EXPERIENCE**





Allen Doyle wrote about this amazing adventure:

"The Episcopal Church in Wyoming recently hosted a Youth Backpacking Trip into the Wind River Mountain Range called "The Spirit of the Winds" This event was organized by Jordan Bishop, Rector at Trinity Episcopal Church in Lander and Coordinator for Youth Ministry in

our Diocese, and Allen Doyle, our Director of Campus Ministry. We partnered with a Christian Backpacking Non-Profit in Laramie (Solid Rock Outdoor Ministry) that took care of gear rentals, first-aid, permit, insurance, logistics, and additional supervision so that we could stay in compliance with Safeguarding God's Children with 3 male and 1 female chaperones on the trip. But they also provided some significant spiritual reflection and guidance throughout the trip. We were incredibly impressed by their ministry and were grateful to partner


with them. Jordan and I provided a more Anglican flavor to the trip, leading Compline each night and we even had a lakeside Eucharist on the last evening!

The trip began July 10th in Laramie, where we got all our gear organized before heading west. We used Trinity Episcopal Church in Lander as our base camp that night. We had a Lock-In in the Sanctuary and the foosball table in the Parish Hall was a big hit! The next morning we headed through Sinks Canyon to the Worthen Meadows Trailhead. We filled up our water, used the vault toilet for the last time, and hit the trail!

This was no walk in the park. Round trip the Youth hiked 27 miles with an elevation gain of approximately 3,500 feet up and then back down. The trip culminated with a Peak Attempt on Roaring Fork Mountain (which towers 12,300+ ft. over glaciers and lakes in the valleys below. This took many different skills as we hiked and climbed off trail almost the entire way! Coming down we were helped

out by some nice snow fields which we were able to sled down safely. The Youth got fancy on the last one and even did some cool spins and jumps while remaining safe and in control!

The Youth weren't also just following along from the guides, they were key in the trip's success. They learned to use a Topographical Map, some key orienteering skills, how to back a backpack, to take care of blisters, and how to set up a tent. But most importantly they were in charge of their own meals. We divided the youth into 2 cooking groups. They carried their own stoves, pots, pans, and food and were responsible for cooking their own meals each night! They were only assisted as asked. Did you know that this church has 5 future chefs in your midst? They all cooked some delicious meals for themselves. A fan favorite was cheesy mashed potatoes and summer sausage!





These youth displayed remarkable toughness. The packs were heavy, it was the hottest week of the year thus far, the mosquitos were terrible, and the sun was so bright. But they persisted! And it was truly



inspiring. When we reached the top of Roaring Fork Peak, we all shared who we had been thinking of when we were hiking up. And what this experience meant for them. Most of the Youth spoke about family members that loved them and supported them. And how thinking about that love gave them strength and courage. We also asked how it felt to be on top of a mountain peak!

And some of the responses moved me to tears. "I feel free" one said. Another said "I feel POWERFUL!". One chimed in, "If I can climb a whole mountain, there's nothing I ☆ can't do."

There was also some real-talk that was hard to hear, but so important to talk about. They shared about some other friends and family that called them names, that said they couldn't do this trip, that they were not strong or tough enough to make it. But wow. Did they prove them wrong!







When we got back to Laramie, the joy and pride on each of their faces was contagious! One youth noted "I didn't know my body could do this!", and all shared in their own words how proud of themselves they were. Maybe some of these youth will become big-time nature lovers. But even if they never go camping again, it is our hope and prayer that this experience will stick with them the rest of their lives. That they pushed themselves further then they know they could go. That they can do things that are way out of their comfort zone. That they are tough and smart and awesome survivalists! And that they are worthy of God's Love, that they are worthy of a Loving, Supportive Community, and that they should Love Themselves too!


Thank you to the folks at St. Christopher's for supporting so many young people and their families throughout the year!




Father Paul's Corner

Embracing St. Christopher's Family with Clayton & Lynda Hardgrave

Lynda Ambrose was born in Cheyenne as a 4th generation Cheyenne resident. She started attending St. Christopher's Church in 1954. She attended Sunday school with many of her school friends (Ted

Maxwell being one). She was a member of Job's Daughters Bethel 39, filling all of the messengers' chairs under various queens. After school one spring day she drove a friend to work at the A & W on S. Greeley Hwy. Two guys parked next to Lynda and asked for a ride in her 1959

convertible. That was when she met Clayton and after two years of dating, they were married at St. Christopher's. Clayton lived and was raised at the Airport Golf Club. He joined the Army at 17 and was stationed in Germany for most of his enlistment. He went to work at the Highway Department (WYDOT) and retired after 30 + years. After 4 years of marriage their 1st son, Jason was born. Jason went to U. W. and while working a summer job, he met his wife, Sidney Thomas. After he graduated from KU with a doctorate, they moved to Evansville, Indiana & he is currently interim assistant provost. Sidney works with Nonprofit organizations. Lynda was hired at the base as a civilian GS2 clerk typist. (Son #2, Eric, was born during Lynda's first year of working at the base and he works IT for the Federal Bankruptcy court). Lynda's 2nd position was at the Civil Engineer's squadron. The third organization was the Medical Group. The last position there was head of budget, managing an \$8 million budget. After 30 + years she retired from civil service. Marla Norman then hired her with a part time job at the heart surgeons' office and after 10 years, she retired for good. Both boys and their grandson earned their Eagle Scout awards at the age of 13. When the boys were away at college, Clayton and Lynda became active at St. Christopher's. Clayton was mostly part of Building & Grounds. Lynda was also involved with Gifts and Bequests; St. Elizabeth's Guild; she organizes the annual Bazaar & Craft Show (with LOTS of help) and is Jr. Warden. Since Clayton & Lynda were only children they have a small family. St. Christopher's members have become part of their family & that is

such a blessing.

You don't see them in church from June to early October. They spend their time at their cabin enjoying the wonders God has provided!


